# Celebrating 125 Years of Our Faith's Harvest

Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church began in 1890 and has been nurtured for 125 years. At its peak it had evolved to be one of the most influential Black Churches in the Roanoke Valley. The story of Roanoke's Black Renaissance cannot be told without referencing Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church pastors, its distinguished congregation, and its commitment to the growth and development of the community and African American youth. The range and stature of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church includes its influence on Roanoke's boom period, the growth of Black Business entrepreneurs, the movement of civil rights/desegregation, and most importantly, the facilitation of the pursuit of higher education among the Black youth of Roanoke.

There is a lot of history that can be told related to Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, and during our 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration we have attempted to provide a variety of activities that reflect the many benchmarks of the church. Over the last year and a half we have hosted theme celebration services that told the story of the church and its people which culminate with our finale homecoming service today.

The success of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church could not have happened without the Roanoke First Presbyterian Church (currently First Evangelical Presbyterian Church) under the leadership of Dr. William Creighton Campbell who gave permission to Rev. P. R. Twine to conduct group meetings and Sunday school classes for blacks to take place in the basement of the church. The Sunday school facilitated the birth of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church. The founders were Lucy Addison, Thomas T. Henry, John Riley DuPree, Jesse Wingfield, C. E. Dodson, Ervin I. Terry, and Alfred F. Brooks.

May 15, 2016—The kickoff of the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary began with a Service of Renewal & Thanksgiving held at First Evangelical Presbyterian Church with our guest preacher the Rev. Dr. Brian K. Blount, President of Union Presbyterian Seminary. He

brought a powerful charge for Fifth Avenue to continue our journey in Christ.

August 28, 2016—The church hosted an all church picnic at Carvins Cove. Over 40 members were in attendance. In addition to the great food and camaraderie, the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee conducted a historical quiz on the milestones of Fifth Avenue: its founders, its community leaders, it families and contributions to the life of the Gainsboro and the greater Roanoke community. Prizes were given to the members who answered the most questions correctly.

September 18, 2016 — The church held its annual Men's Day Program. This year's program honored three young men of the church who are pursuing undergraduate and graduate studies. An honorarium was given to Yosef Bruer, Brandon Keith, and Ja'land Robinson. The men wanted to pay tribute and provide support to the future leaders of our church.

November 5, 2016—The youth of the church sponsored a Fall Fun Day as a fundraiser to support the activities of the youth. Hot dog combo platters, baked desserts, raffle tickets, and crafts were sold. There was a variety of games played, face painting, and bouncy gymnastics were enjoyed by everyone. Many of the congregation, neighbors, families and friends came to support the event.

For Black History Month members of the anniversary committee provided biographical sketches of luminary figures of Fifth Avenue members who were trailblazers in shaping the Black history of Roanoke. Each Sunday in February a presentation was made on one of the following members: Lucy Addison, Rev. Dr. Lylburn L. Downing, Henry C. Johnson, and Audrey L. Whitlock. Black History month concluded with a Black History Month Celebratory luncheon buffet after the morning church service on February 26, 2017.

Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church was a "mega" church in its prime, not because of its size but because of its resilience, pride and the greatness of its members as stakeholders and investors in the renaissance of the Black community. A mega church as defined in today's terms it will never be, but Fifth Avenue, if the work of the past is any indicator, will always consist of a few dedicated people trying to do many great things with God's help.

A seed was planted in 1890 that bore fruit and grew into an orchard on the hill of 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue in Northwest Roanoke. Today we culminate 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of our faith's harvest. During this span of time we have experienced many seasons of abundant crops, as well as small crops; but, "Thanks be to God!", the church has never experienced a season that has been barren. Fruit still grows on a hill on Patton Avenue. We thank you for dropping by to sample our special fruit and ask you to pray for us as we continue to spread God's joy throughout the Roanoke Valley.
