Why do we ring the chimes?

For centuries, churches have used bells to announce to the whole community that it is time for worship. Bells, or chimes, tell us it is time to cease our chatter so that we can focus on the reason we are here: we have come to worship a sovereign God who demands our full attention.

We sound our chimes three times, once for each member of the Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Lighting the Advent Candles

In the ancient world, various peoples lit fires to mark the turning of the light into winter's season and to pray for the return of the light. The church has Christianized that practice in the lighting of the candles on the Advent wreath. To us, these candles are signs of the growing light of Christ who is coming again in all fullness into the darkness of our world.

Advent wreaths are attributed to Martin Luther. They are made of evergreen branches which form a circle, symbolizing the never-ending love of God and the promise of eternal life through Christ. Four candles, three purple and one pink, represent the four Sundays of Advent. The purple candles signify penance. The pink candle is lit on the third Sunday, interrupting our self-examination with a reminder of the joy we know at the coming of the Christ Child.

The white candle in the center of the wreath is lit on Christmas Eve as we celebrate the birth of our Savior, and is called the Christ Candle. We re-light this candle on the Sunday following Christmas as we celebrate the season of Christmas which ends on Epiphany (January 6).

"Advent" means coming or arrival. During the four weeks of this season, we celebrate Christ's coming in the world and watch with expectant hope for his coming again. It is a time for communal discernment and personal examination. We have been told through scripture to prepare so that we are ready for the Christ when he comes.

Until the dawning of that Great Day when Christ will return, we watch and wait for Christ's coming into the darkness of our world, lighting candles of hope, faith, joy, peace, and love; and remembering the promises of God with prayer.

Lift up your heads, Ogates! And be lifted up, O ancient doors! that the King of glory may come in. (Psalm 24:7)

- One of the best predictors of college readiness is academic achievement by 8th grade.¹

 People who hold a bachelor's degree earn 65% more over the course of their working lives than high school graduates.³ They are also twice as likely to be employed.⁴

When asked about what other students would think if they had the change to attend Menaul School, Mariposa says, "There's diversity like they have never experienced in any other school. Overall, it's wonderful."
